COMMISSIONERS COURT REGULAR SESSION

February 28, 2005

The Hunt County Commissioners Court met this day at 10:00A.M.with all Commissioners present with Judge Joe Bobbitt presiding. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

OLD BUSINESS:

— 'Discuss and possibly approve Final Plat for Graham Point Estates, Phase II in Pct 2 – Sam Havens:' Commissioner Green requested this item be dropped from the Agenda.

NEW BUSINESS:

9362 On the motion by Phillip Martin, second by Kenneth Thornton, the Court approved Proclamation making March 20-26, 2005 as "Poison Prevention Week" in Hunt County. *See Attachment*.

9363 On the motion by Judge Bobbitt, second by Ralph Green, the Court approved the Hunt County Racial Profiling Report for 2004 requested by March of each year, presented by Chief Deputy – Robert White. *See Attachment*.

9364 On the motion by Green, second by Martin, the Court approved application request for the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant. This is a joint grant from the DOJ, with City of Greenville receiving 60%- \$17,896.68 and Hunt County receiving 40%- \$15,245.32 and a 10% administrative fee. Grant funding to be used for projects started out by grant – updating digital video cameras in cars and by replacing ammunition sitting on shelves since 1998. Judge Bobbitt requested an account sheet for future back-ups and the Court gives County Judge authority to sign. *See Attachment*.

9365 On the motion by Martin, second by Jim Latham, the Court approved transfer of the Nitestar Distance Measuring Instrument from the 911 Co-coordinator's Office to Pct 3, due to changing computers, this equipment can no longer be used in the 911 office.

This equipment will assist Commissioner Martin in measuring troads.

9366 On the motion by Latham, second by Green, the Court approved approximately 100ft of dirt to rock road upgrade on CR 4807 in Pct 4. Money deposited into Escrow Account.

9367 On the motion by Thornton, second by Green, the Court approved Proclamation making March 6-12, 2005 as "Severe Weather Week" in Hunt County.

9368 On the motion by Thornton, second by Green, the Court approved the final plat for Kellogg Korner Addition in Pct 1 presented by Bob Laman.

QMF Steel Industrial Park Addition in Pct 4. Bobby Stovall from Kincey-Sabine Title and Developer Larry Jackson were present to discuss this issue with the Court. Since Hunt County has never had a Commercial Subdivision brought before the Court and our subdivision rules have not been updated, therefore, the Court had concerns on numerous issues concerning the maintenance of these roads, stating once the Court accepts maintenance it is up to the Commissioners to maintain. Commissioner Martin noted subdivision rules mention "Commercial". Judge Bobbitt stated any Municipality that ask for ETJ back, if they go through proper paperwork, the Court would not stand in their way. Commissioner Latham requested a Letter of Credit to assure the building of the road per regulation of the County until time when road is completed, at that time, a \$30,000.00 road bond will be posted for 1 year from time road is completed until accepted by the County Maintenance system. Commissioner Latham requested an asphalt road be built. Judge Bobbitt stated we would go with the standard subdivision rules, with no caveat added.

9370 On the motion by Green, second by Martin, the Court approved clarification of the legal description for The Oaks Subdivision in Pct 2, due to a surveyor's mistake in the original. Plat not to be amended or changed – attach clarification to plat already filed.

9371 On the motion by Green, second by Thornton, the Court approved issuance of a maintenance bond of \$25,000.00 (10% of actual \$250,000.00 cost of road) for a one-year period of time in the event the County has to do any work on this road. Commissioner Green stated County can accept this road today, in 1 year County will relinquish the bond and take the road over. (Red Oak Dr. and Ash Drive into Oaks subdivision.)

Judge Bobbitt and the Commissioners Court presented a retirement plaque to Roy

16, 1989 to February 28, 2005.

Program Narrative

City of Greenville, Texas



A joint application award of \$33,142 has been made available to the County of Hunt, Texas and the City of Greenville, Texas. A Memorandum of Understanding exists between these two entities.

The City of Greenville is pursuing a course to upgrade the in-car video systems that are used by the Greenville Police Department in their patrol fleet. The upgrade is necessitated first by the need to replace aging video systems whose reliability and future repair is in question, and secondly, there are advances in mobile video systems that are critical to many of the enforcement efforts pursued by our police department.

This improvement in technology for law enforcement enables our department to provide high quality video and still photographs of suspects and victims to investigators, prosecutors and the courts. This ability, as we have experienced, leads to more cases being cleared due to the identification of suspects, the recording of their movements, actions and statements. Our prosecutors routinely ask and receive video and audio evidence to support the prosecution of family violence assaults, drug offenses and many other offenses that can be tied to involvement in drug use or sales. The advanced video system's also allows the actual video to be stored for an indefinite period of time in different formats.

This award will not replace or supplant, nonfederal funds that have

been appropriated for the purpose of improving mobile video equipment.

Whereas, the Agreement is made under the authority of Sections,

Whereas the County agrees to provide the City \$17,896.68 from the JAG award for the car video system program: and
Whereas the City and County believe it to be in their best interests to reallocate the JAG funds.

PROGRAM NARRATIVE

COUNTY OF HUNT, TEXAS

A joint application award of \$33,142.00 had been made available to the County of Hunt and the City of Greenville. Texas. A memorandum of understanding exists between these two entities dividing the money with 10% (ten percent) of the grant going to Hunt County for the administrative fee, then 40% (forty percent) of the remaining funds to go to the Hunt County Sheriff's Office for a total of \$15,245.32 and the remaining amount, 60% (sixty percent) or \$17.896.68 to go to the Greenville. Texas Police Department.

The County of Hunt is in the process of training new members of the existing tactical team within the Sheriff's Office. In order to do so, it is necessary to replace old existing ammunition, tear gas, non-lethal equipment, radio equipment, and support items for the office area.

These projects are in support of existing projects that have been financed with Federal Grant monies received by this Sheriff's Office since 1998 and continuing through 2004. This money will be used to purchase and update systems already in use, such as: Vehicle audio/visual recorders, distraction devices and the reloads for them, flameless gas expulsion grenades, 12 gauge liquid agent barricade rounds, hot dog systems for the k-9 units, a fax/copy machine for the office, remote microphones for handheld radios, audio/visual tapes and other support items for these systems.

The current ammunition, tear gas and other special weapons used by the existing tactical team were purchased in 1998, and could be unreliable due to the age of the existing ones. The old munitions will be used in training exercises for the tactical team and the newly formed Haz-Mat unit formed in Hunt County.

This grant will not replace or supplant non-federal funds that have been appropriated for the purpose of improving the programs described above.
