Our History



Founded by a Greenville Police Officer, the first Club served kids in Greenville who needed a safe space during out of school time. In 2002, the Club expanded services to Commerce. In 2015, the Club merged with the Boys & Girls Club in Rockwall County. In 2020, the Club opened a new site in the rural community of Lone Oak. In 2021, the club expanded services in Rockwall by opening a Teen Center. Currently, the Club serves over 1000 youth in Greenville, Commerce, Lone Oak, and Rockwall.

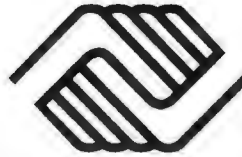

SIGNATURE CHARACTER & LEADERSHIP PROGRAM:



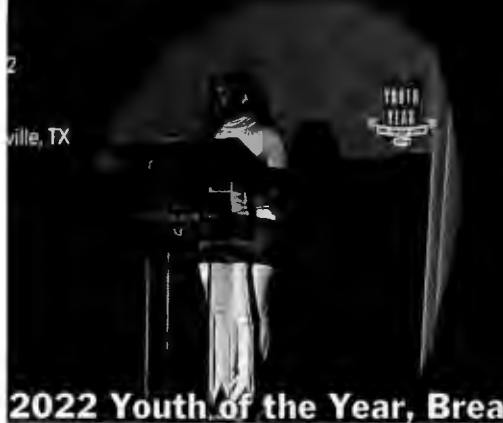
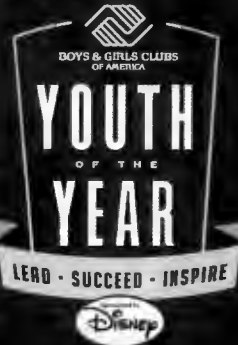

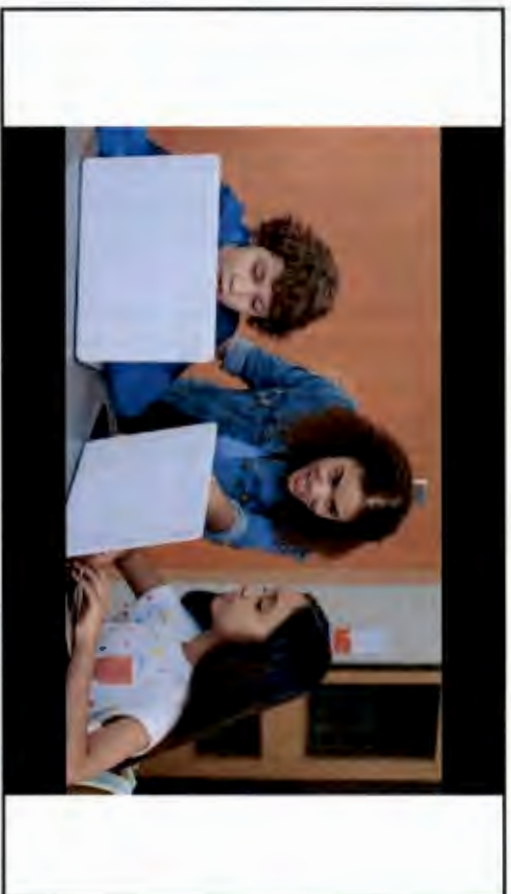

SMART MOVES

SMART Moves uses a team approach that involves Club staff, peer leaders, parents and community representatives. Young people ages 6 to 15 engage in discussion and role-playing, practicing resilience and refusal skills, developing assertiveness, strengthening decision-making skills and analyzing media and peer influence. The ultimate goal is to promote abstinence from substance abuse and adolescent sexual involvement through the practice of responsible behavior.



Health and Wellness Programs
 These programs develop young people's capacity to engage in positive behaviors to nurture their well-being, set personal goals and grow into self-sufficient adults.



41% of health grade Club girls participate in daily physical activity, compared with 29% of health grade girls nationally. According to BCCA youth outcome data.
